With small class sizes and faculty who are dedicated to mentoring students, the teacher preparation program at Cal Poly Humboldt includes undergraduate, graduate, and credential programs that emphasize practical experience working in classrooms with diverse students at local K-12 schools.

You'll be in the field, at any number of local schools that span 31 school districts in Humboldt County, working with youth from a wide range of linguistic, ethnic, cultural, and socioeconomic backgrounds, including tribal and Hmong communities.

Teachers for Social Justice is an educational community for first-year students, who'll find a network that supports them academically, enlightens them professionally, and connects them to resources that will help smoothly transition into the world of teaching.

Academics & Options

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The Liberal Studies Elementary Education (LSEE) program within the School of Education provides a program of study for a career in the field of elementary education. LSEE students begin observing and interacting in local partner schools from their first semester. As the program progresses and students continue to develop their teacher identities, they take on progressively intensive educational and pedagogical experiences in their practicum placements which include tutoring, small group, and whole class teaching responsibilities. Students acquire teaching skills in a safe environment, guided by a cooperating teacher and university faculty.

Program Concentrations

Elementary Education Concentration

This concentration is designed for students who wish to earn a bachelor's degree only or who have not met the Integrated Teacher Education Program (ITEP) credential admission requirements.

Elementary Education ITEP Concentration

The Elementary Education ITEP concentration allows students to complete a Bachelor of Arts Degree Liberal Studies and a Preliminary Elementary Education Multiple Subjects Teaching Credential in four years.
